MUKHA LEPA CONTRAINDICATIONS

MUKHA LEPA PROCEDURE

Three steps are often involved in the Mukha Lepa method: Purva Karma (preparation), Pradhana Karma (primary procedure), and Paschat Karma (post-operation)

care). Better therapeutic and cosmetic results can be obtained by carrying out these procedures correctly.

A. Karma Purva

The patient's skin type and condition should be evaluated before applying Mukha Lepa. To get rid of grime, oil, and other contaminants, the face is thoroughly washed. To increase the efficiency of the therapy and open the pores in the skin, gentle steaming may be used in some situations.

The Dosha predominance and skin condition are taken into consideration while choosing the herbal substances. To make a smooth paste, herbal powders are combined with appropriate media such water, milk, honey, rose water, or herbal decoctions.

B. Karma Pradhana

Apply the prepared paste evenly throughout the face, being careful not to get any on the lips, nostrils, or eyes. Throughout the process, the patient should stay at ease. The Lepa is applied to the skin for 20 to 30 minutes, or until it has half dried. The therapeutic properties of the herbal constituents are applied to the skin during this time.

C. Karma Paschat

The paste is carefully removed with lukewarm water after the suggested amount of time, and the face is then dried with a soft cloth. Applying a moderate moisturizer or an appropriate herbal oil may be necessary. Maintaining good skin cleanliness, eating a balanced diet, drinking enough water, and limiting exposure to sunshine and pollutants are all important for improved outcomes. When done properly, Mukha Lepa supports general facial health, nourishes the skin, and improves complexion.
